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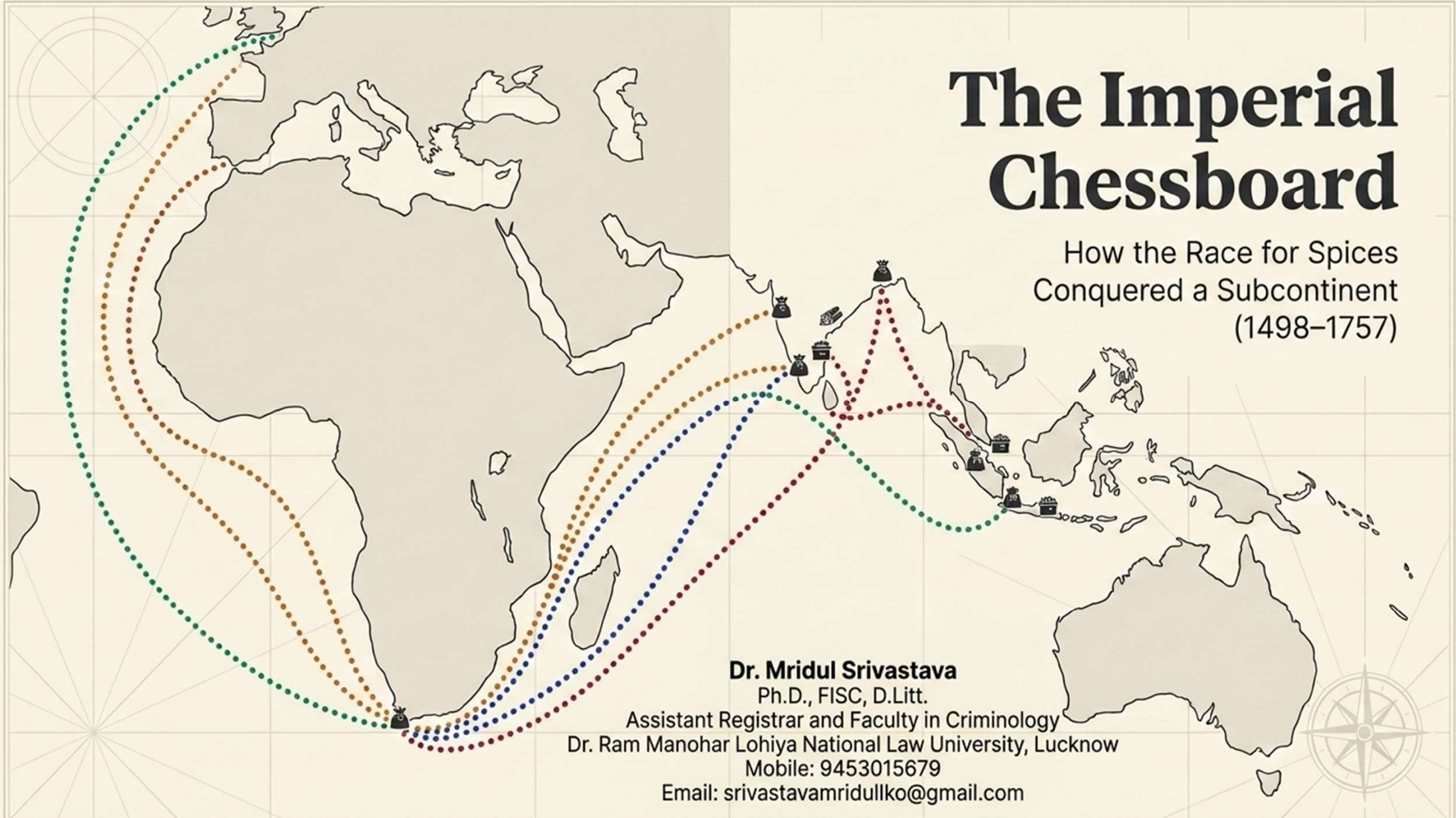
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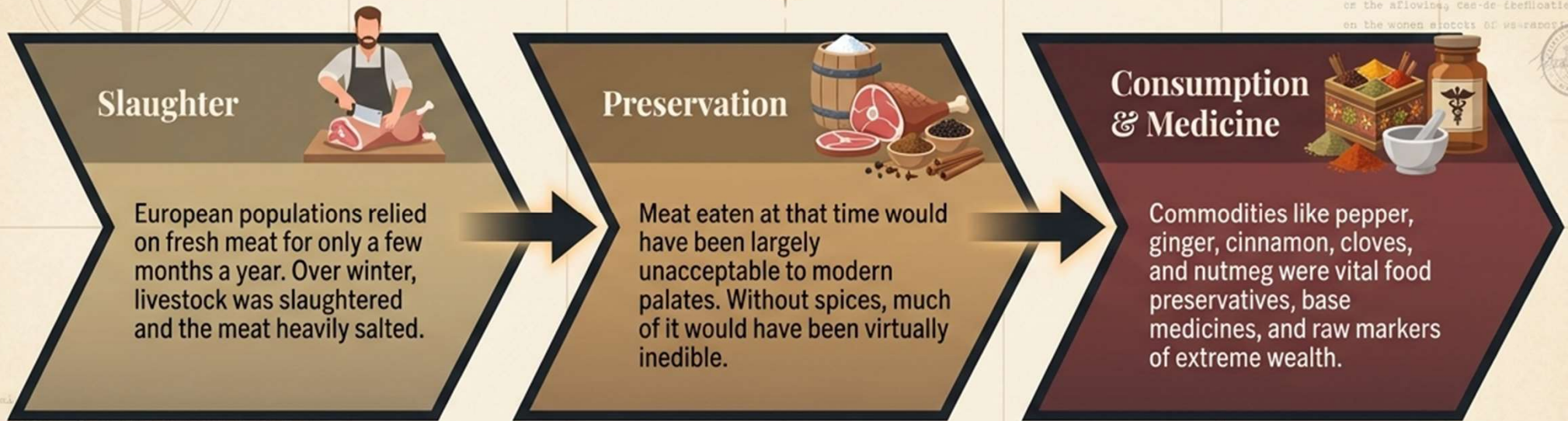
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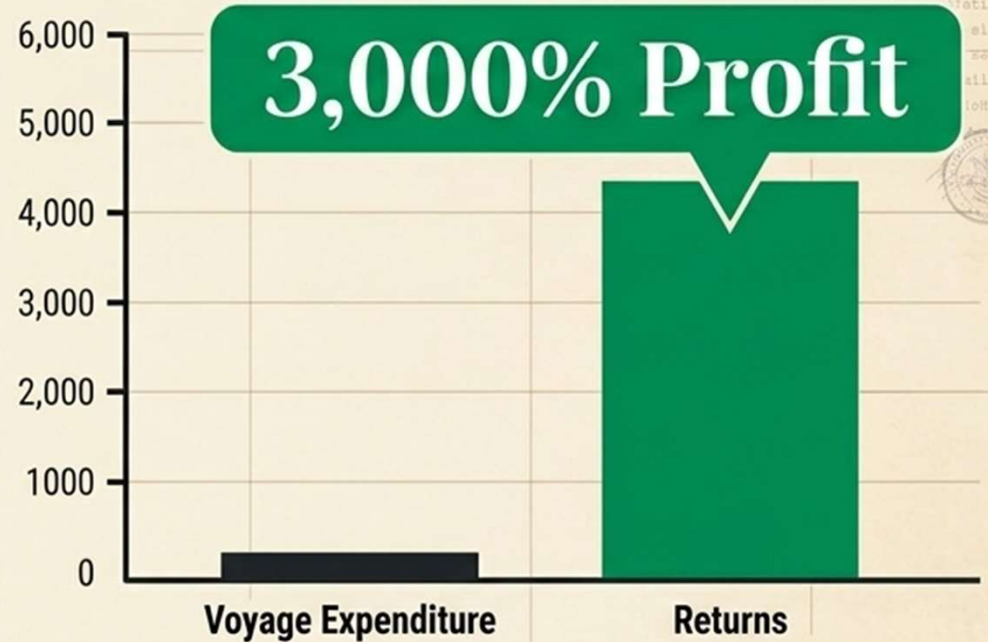
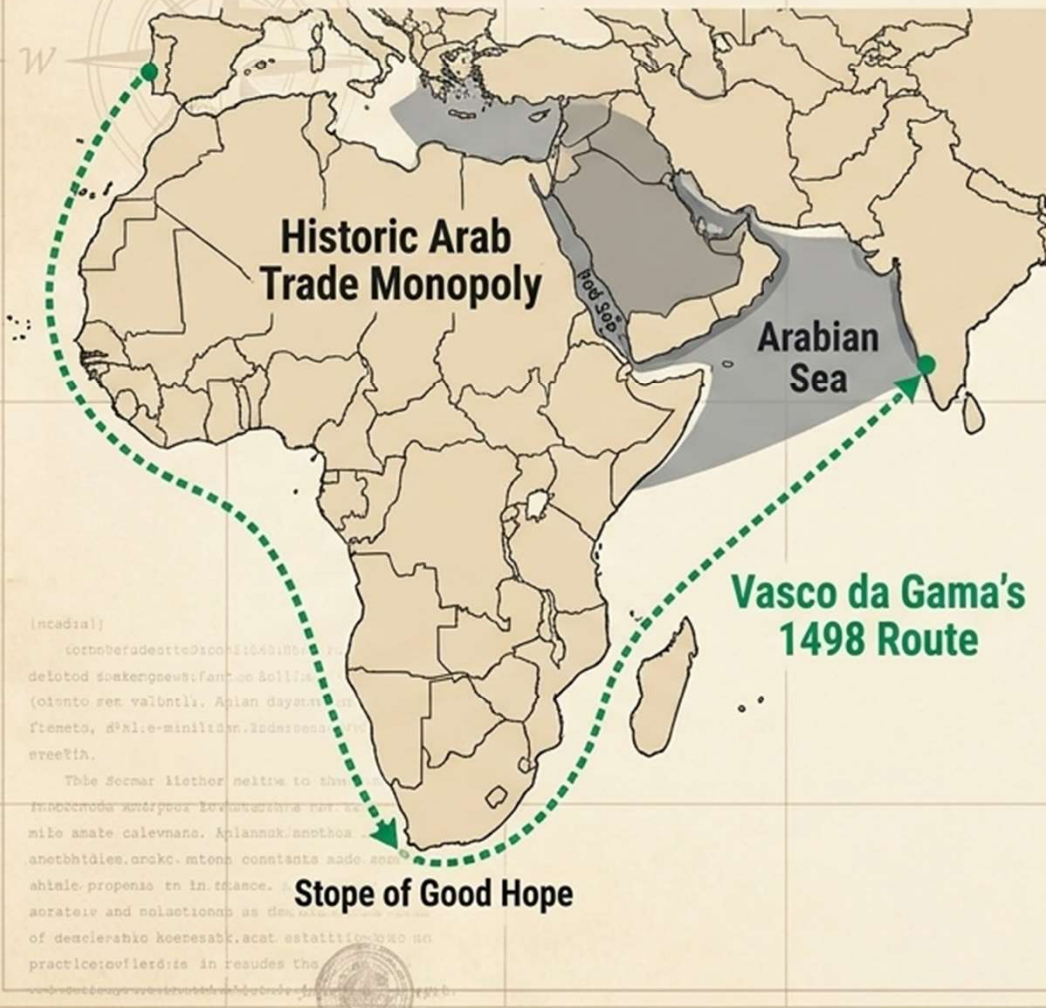
# The 16th-Century Spice Value Chain



**Spices were not merely flavourings; they were life-sustaining commodities akin to modern oil. Men risked their lives, and nations risked their fortunes, to secure them.**

# Vasco da Gama's Revolutionary Voyage (1497-1499)

## The Cape Route and the Profit of Discovery



- **May 1493:** Pope Alexander VI issues a Bull assigning India to Portugal.
- **May 17, 1498:** Da Gama's flagship San Gabriel lands in Calicut.
- **The Result:** He returns to Lisbon with spices sold for 60x his total two-year voyage expenditure. The news spreads like wild fire.

By the dawn of the 17th century, the Spanish/Portuguese monopoly fractured.  
The Indian Ocean transformed into an arena of intense national rivalry,  
competitive trade, and personal jealousy.

## Contender Profile: Portugal

**Strategy:** Fortified strategic factories and naval supremacy.

**Key Figures:** Vasco da Gama, Affonso de Albuquerque (Viceroy, 1509-1515).

1. **1502 Return:** Da Gama returns heavily armed, blasts Calicut port to debris, and brutally **mutilates 800 captives** to establish dominance.
2. **1510 Capture:** Seizure of Goa from the Bijapur Sultanate, becoming Portugal's permanent Indian capital.

**The Mandate:** Albuquerque urged the King to “wrest the wealth of India and business from the hands of the Moors.”

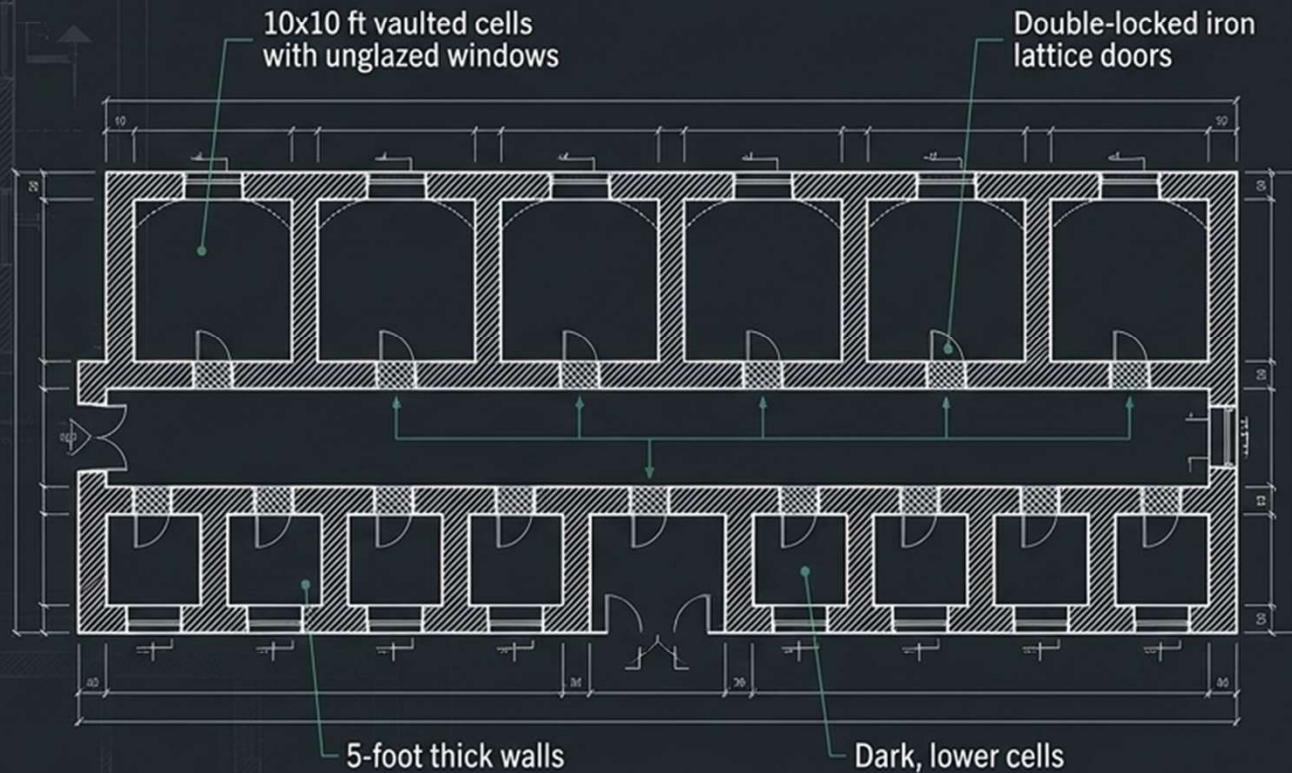
# The Architecture of Inquisition

## Scale:

Built in Goa in the 1600s by Jesuit missionaries.

## Capacity:

Complex of 200 separate cells.



## The Canonical Purpose:

Rather than shedding blood, the church utilized strict solitary confinement as a means of 'purification through suffering', providing conditions under which forced penitence would most likely occur.

# The Netherlands: The Corporate Machine

| ● <b>Founded:</b>     | March 20, 1602 (governed by 76 directors).   |
| ● <b>The Mandate:</b> | A 21-year monopoly with unprecedented state powers to make war, conclude treaties, and hold fortresses.            |
| ● <b>The Pivot:</b>   | Blockaded Goa in 1639, but strategically bypassed India to focus on the lucrative Spice Islands (Batavia/Jakarta). |

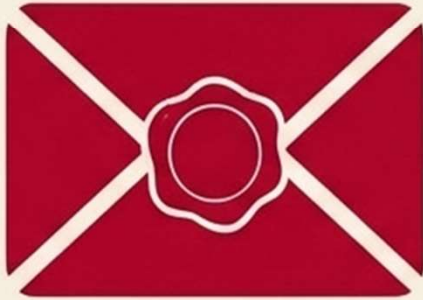
**Exported:** Indigo, saltpetre, cloth, wax, diamonds.

## 1. The Intelligence



- **1583:** English merchant Ralph Fitch is arrested as a spy by the Portuguese and imprisoned in Goa.
- Upon securing bail, he explores the interior of India.
- He reports back to London that Akbar's magnificent capitals (Agra and Fatehpur Sikri) are twice the size of London.

## 2. The Enterprise



- **Dec 31, 1600:** The East India Company is chartered by Queen Elizabeth as a purely mercantile enterprise with no territorial ambitions.
- The 3rd EIC expedition yields staggering returns, becoming the talk of London.
- In 1609, the Company transitions to a permanent joint-stock basis.

# The Pivot: From Ignored Merchants to Indispensable Allies

## Step 1: Rejection (1608)

Capt. William Hawkins arrives in Surat with 25,000 gold pieces. He is ignored; the Mughals do not need English goods, and Portuguese pressure keeps them locked out.



## Step 2: Force (1612)

Capt. Best commands two English ships, ruthlessly blockades Surat's Red Sea trade, and defeats the Portuguese frigates in direct naval combat.



## Step 3: Leverage

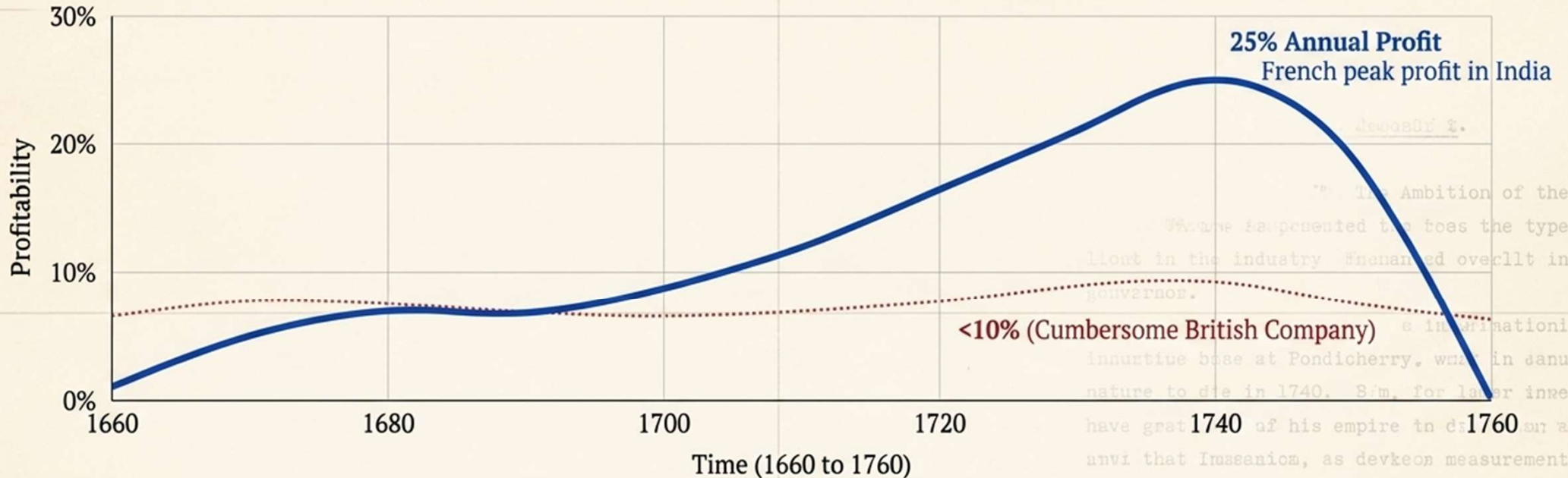
The mighty Mughal army lacks a navy. They begin to view the English as a seaworthy, "less bigoted" alternative to protect their annual pilgrim ships to Mecca from Portuguese harassment.



## Step 4: The Prize (1615-1619)

Sir Thomas Roe leverages this newfound martial respect to secure an imperial firman (treaty) from Jahangir, granting the EIC the right to erect permanent factories and self-govern via their own tribunals.

# France: The Ambition of the State



**1664:** Compagnie des Indes Orientales formed by Colbert with a massive 15 million livres tournois of state capital.

**1674:** Establishment of the primary base at Pondicherry.

**1742 (The Fatal Ambition):** Dupleix abandons purely commercial pursuits to build a sweeping French Empire in India.

**1761 (The Fall):** Triggering the Carnatic Wars, French resources are exhausted. They are outlasted by the English, surrender Pondicherry, and permanently lose political power.

# The Evolution of the East India Company

## **The State** (1686)

The EIC is formally empowered by new Charters to erect courts of judicature, exercise martial law, and coin its own money.

## **The Sovereign** (1668)

Bombay is transferred from the King of England to the EIC for an annual rent of just £10, growing into an independent Presidency.

## **The Landlord** (1639)

Leasing Madras from a local ruler to build a fortified factory, known as Fort St. George.

## **The Renter** (Early 1600s)

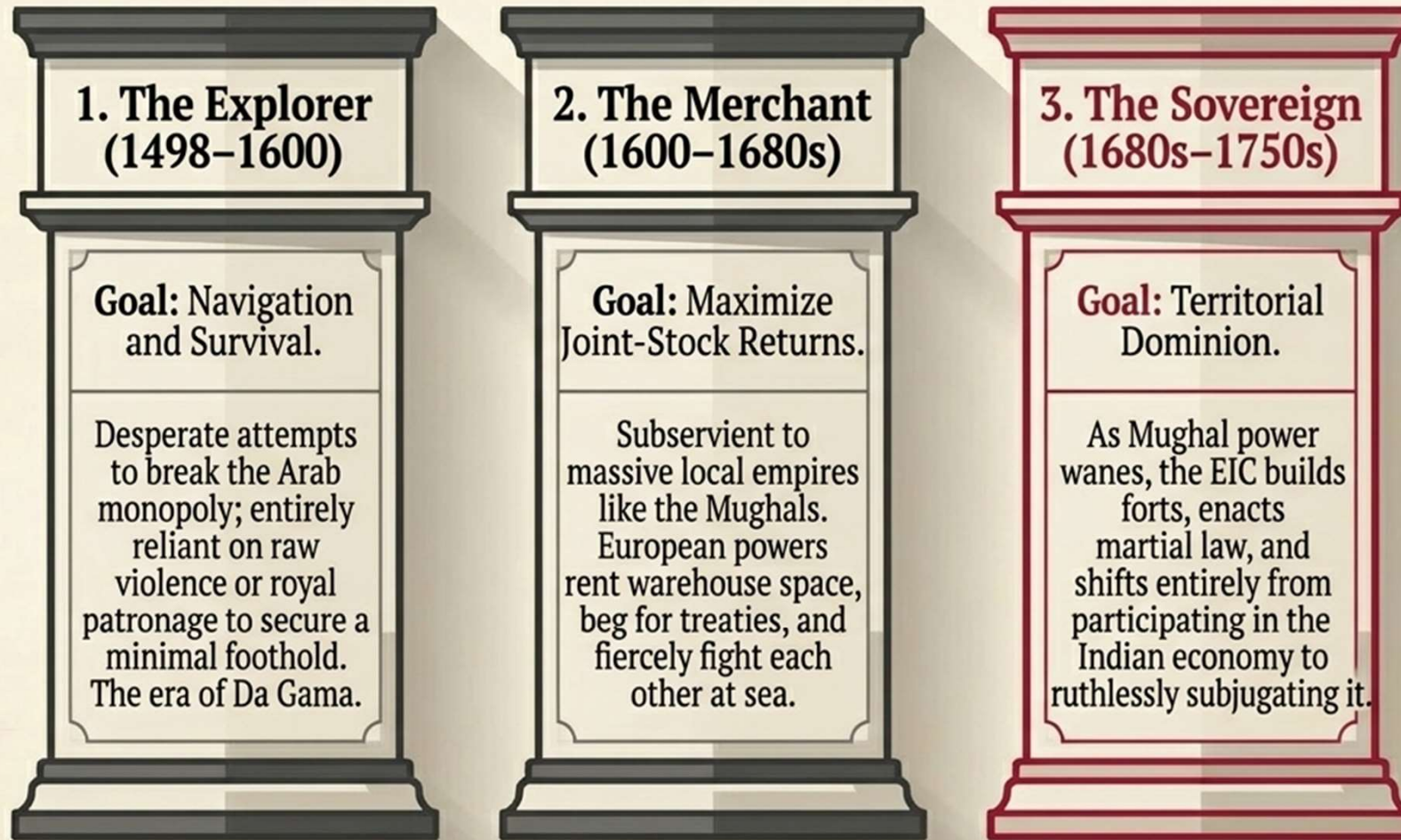
Establishing localized 'factories' (warehouses) by permission of the Mughals. A strict policy of quiet trade.

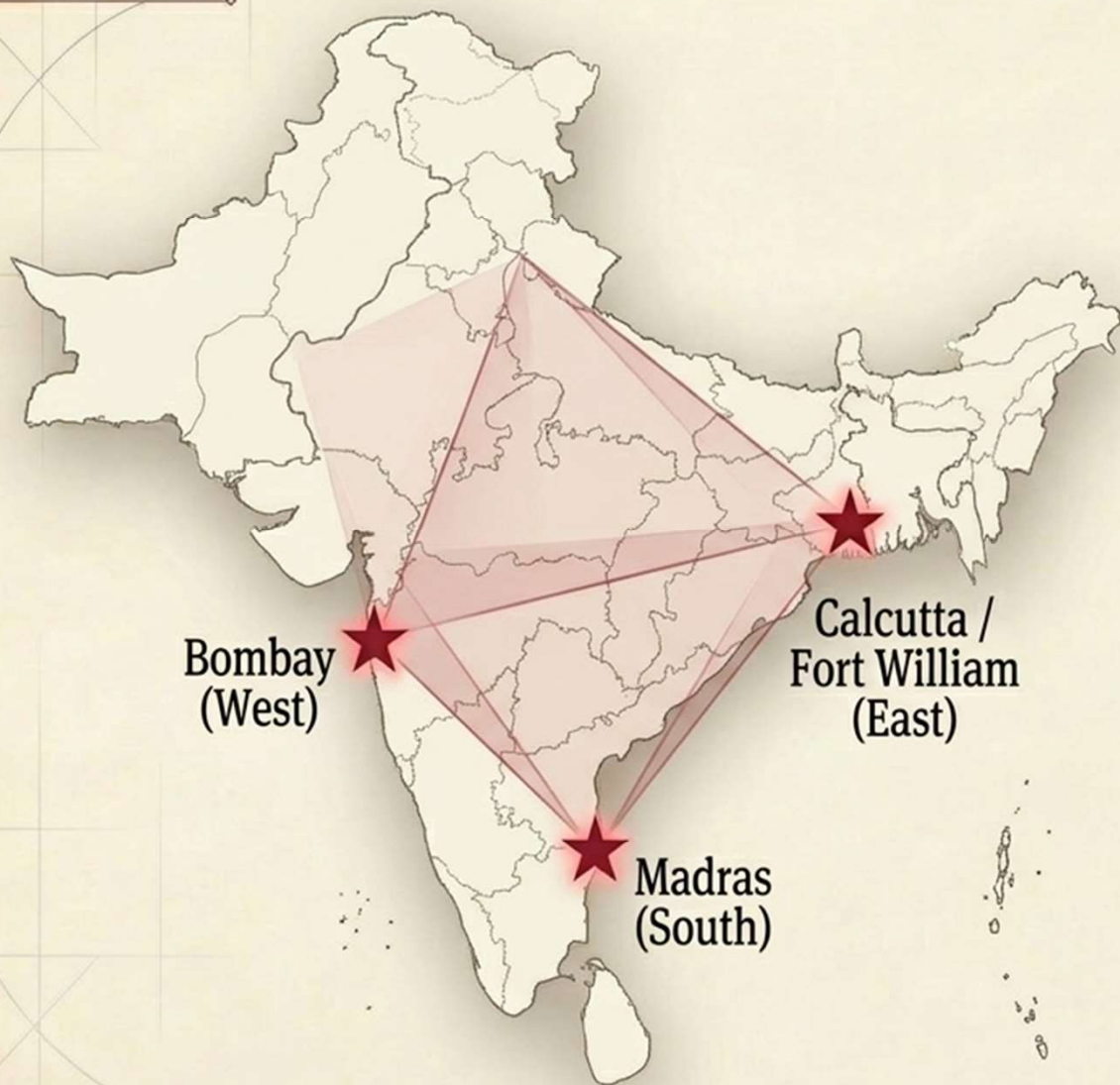

**The Philosophical Turning Point:** This letter fundamentally changed Company policy. By 1687, the Directors officially approved the establishment of civil and military power to secure “a large, well grounded, secure English dominion in India for all time to come.”

## The Final Board

The EIC acquired huge chunks of land, administered by a President and Council in these three 'Presidency towns'.

## 1757: The Checkmate

Clive's victory at Plassey cements Calcutta as the headquarters of an expanding conquered territory.
