Prison Administration in 1886: Directives of the North-Western Provinces & Oudh

Administrative & Fiscal Discipline



Year-End Financial Deadlines

All unexpended Public Works funds lapse to the Government after 1 April annually.



Remission for Fine Default

Prisoners serving 2+ years for unpaid fines may earn sentence reductions through labour.



Capital Works Reporting

Superintendents must immediately report any unutilised building money for reallocation to other works.



Protection from Environmental Hazards

Barracks must be fitted with Tat Purdahs to shield prisoners from cold winds.



Death Row Petitions

Appeals for condemned prisoners require English-language dockets and confirmation of execution dates.



Welfare & Prisoner Rights

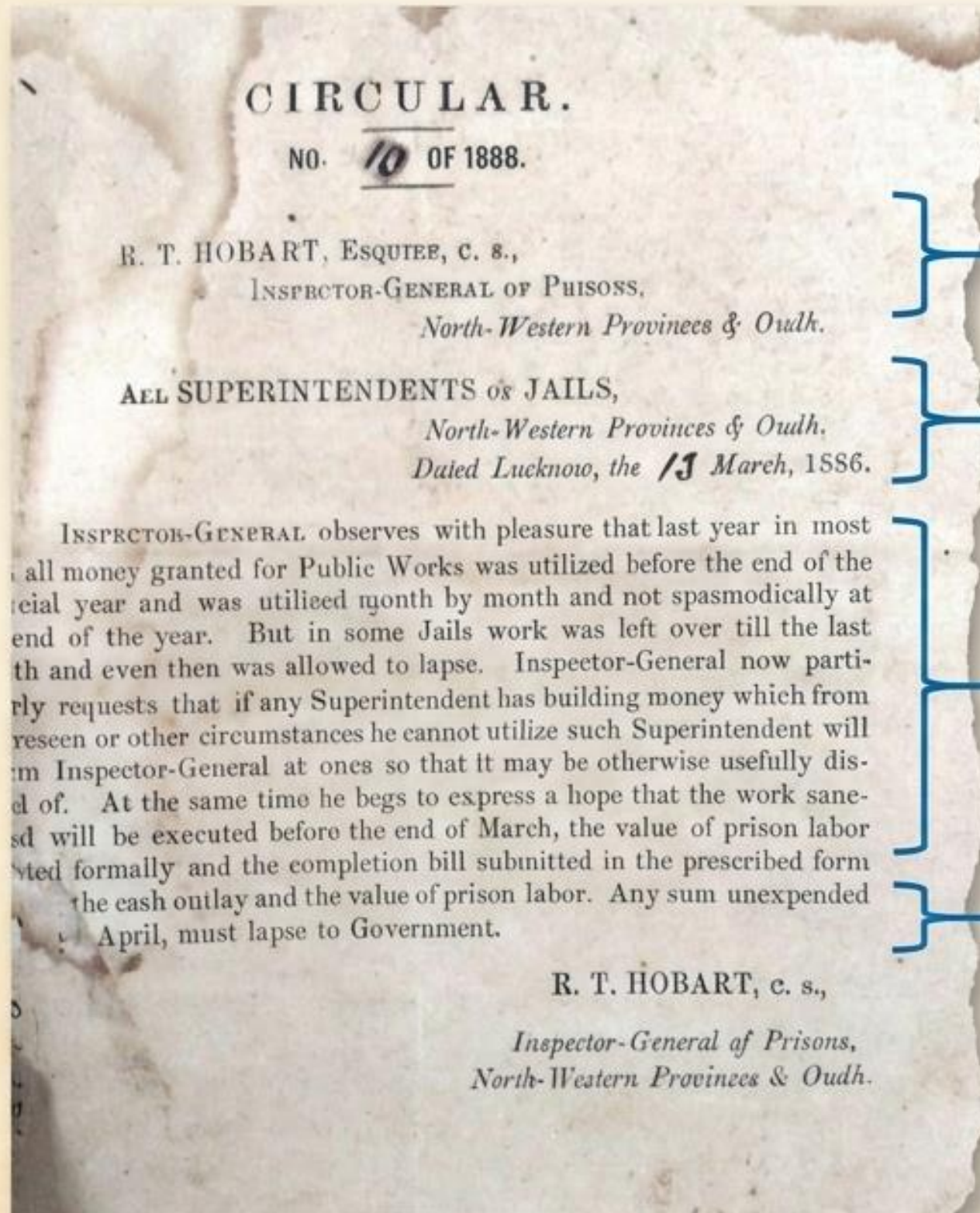


Medical Officer Discretion

Medical Officers determine the necessity and estimates for protective weather-proofing in prison barracks.



Anatomy of a Colonial Circular



The Issuer

The central executive authority commanding the regional penal network.

The Addressee

The operational managers receiving mandatory, system-wide directives.

The Subject & Directive

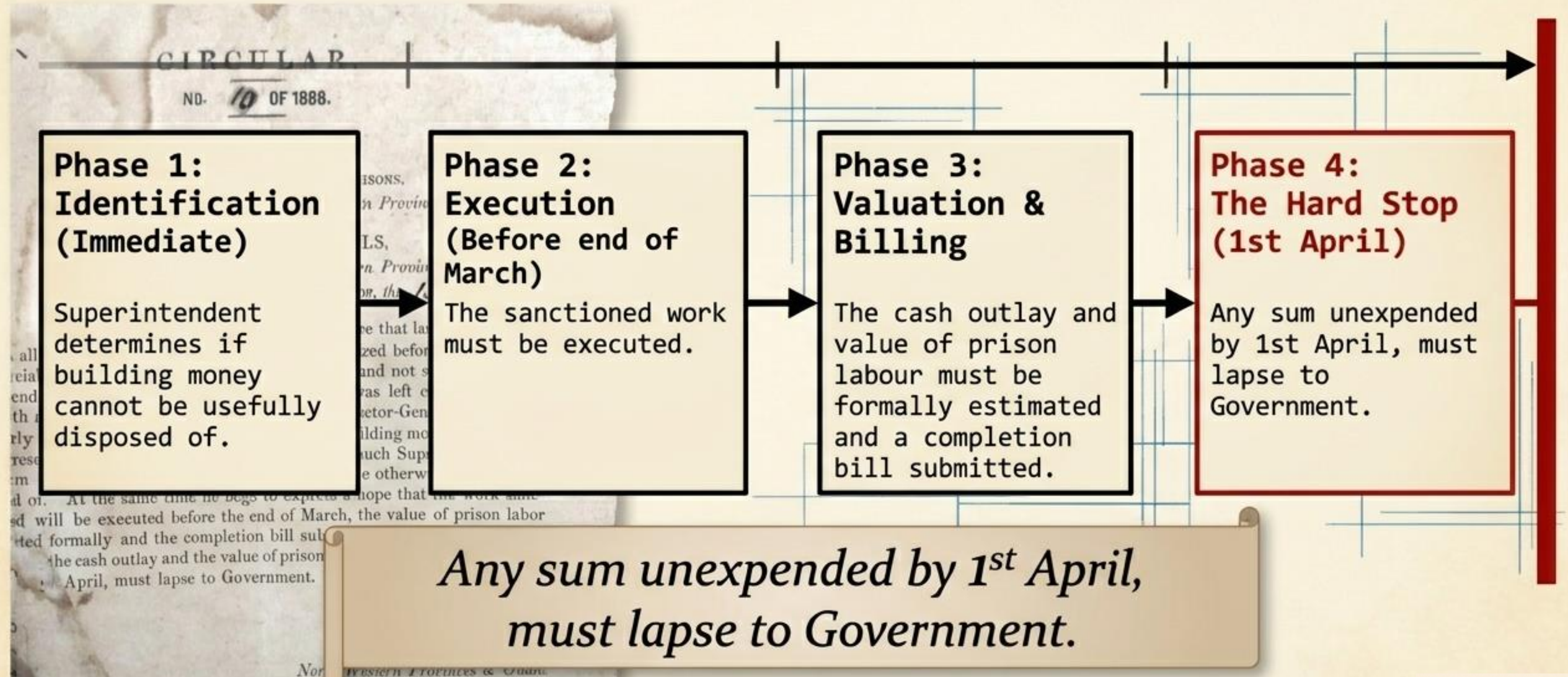
The specific operational protocol being enforced, ranging from budget constraints to inmate welfare.

The Deadline/Threat

The bureaucratic consequence of failing to execute the directive.

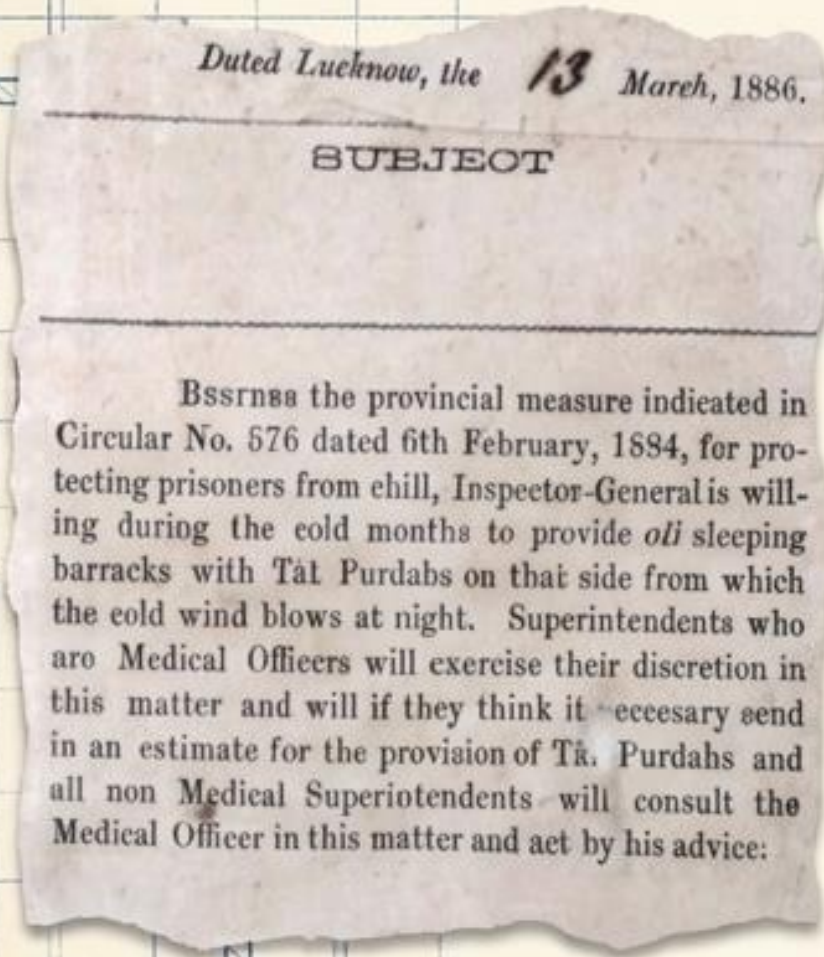
The Fiscal Machine: Navigating the 'March Rush'

Circular No. 10 (13 March 1886) addresses a critical bureaucratic vulnerability: the expiration of unspent public works budgets.

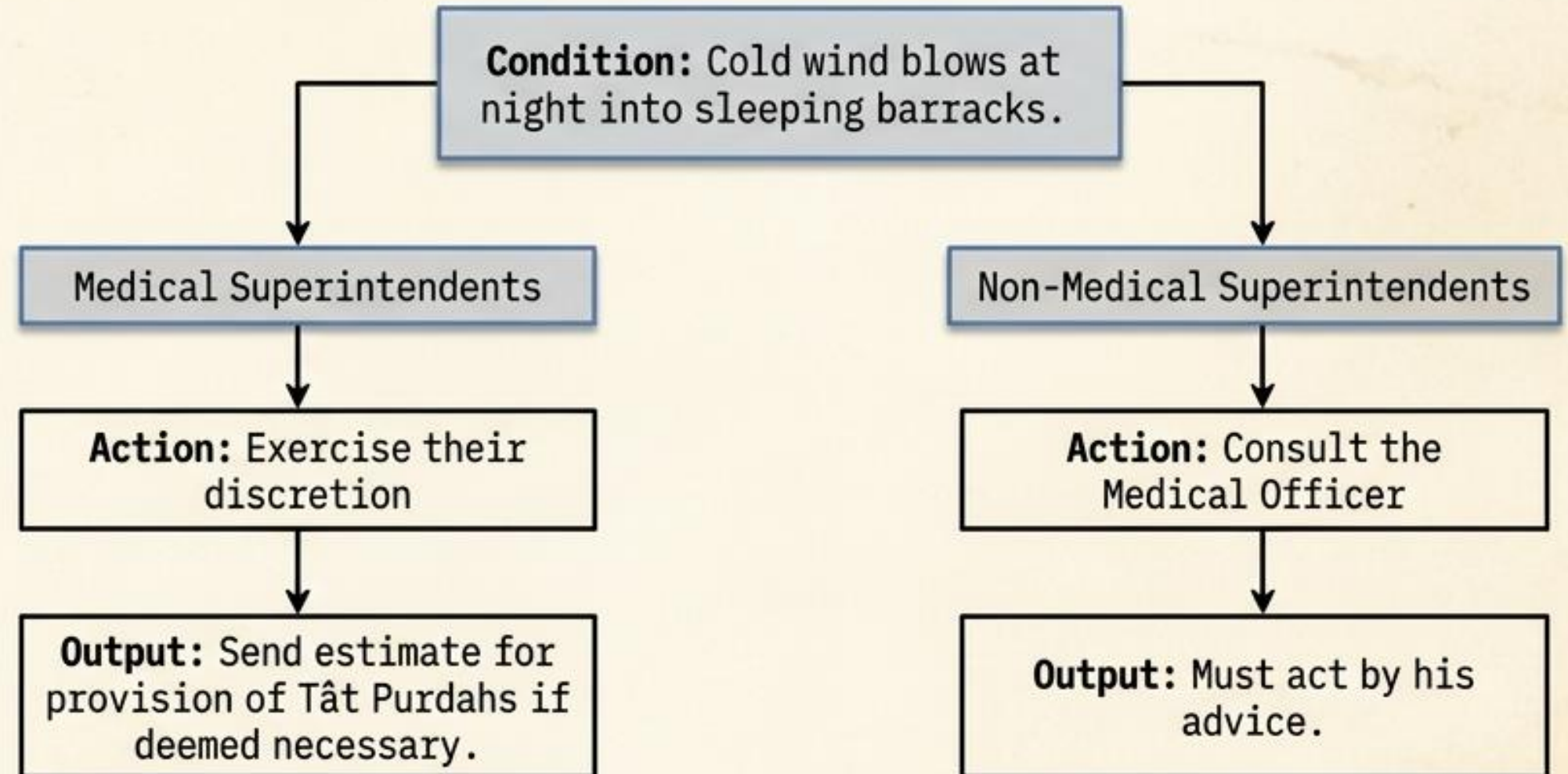


The Biological Machine: Delegating Inmate Welfare

Circular No. 11 outlines the protocol for protecting prisoners from chill by installing Tât Purdahs (canvas screens). Authority to act is strictly partitioned by medical credentialing.



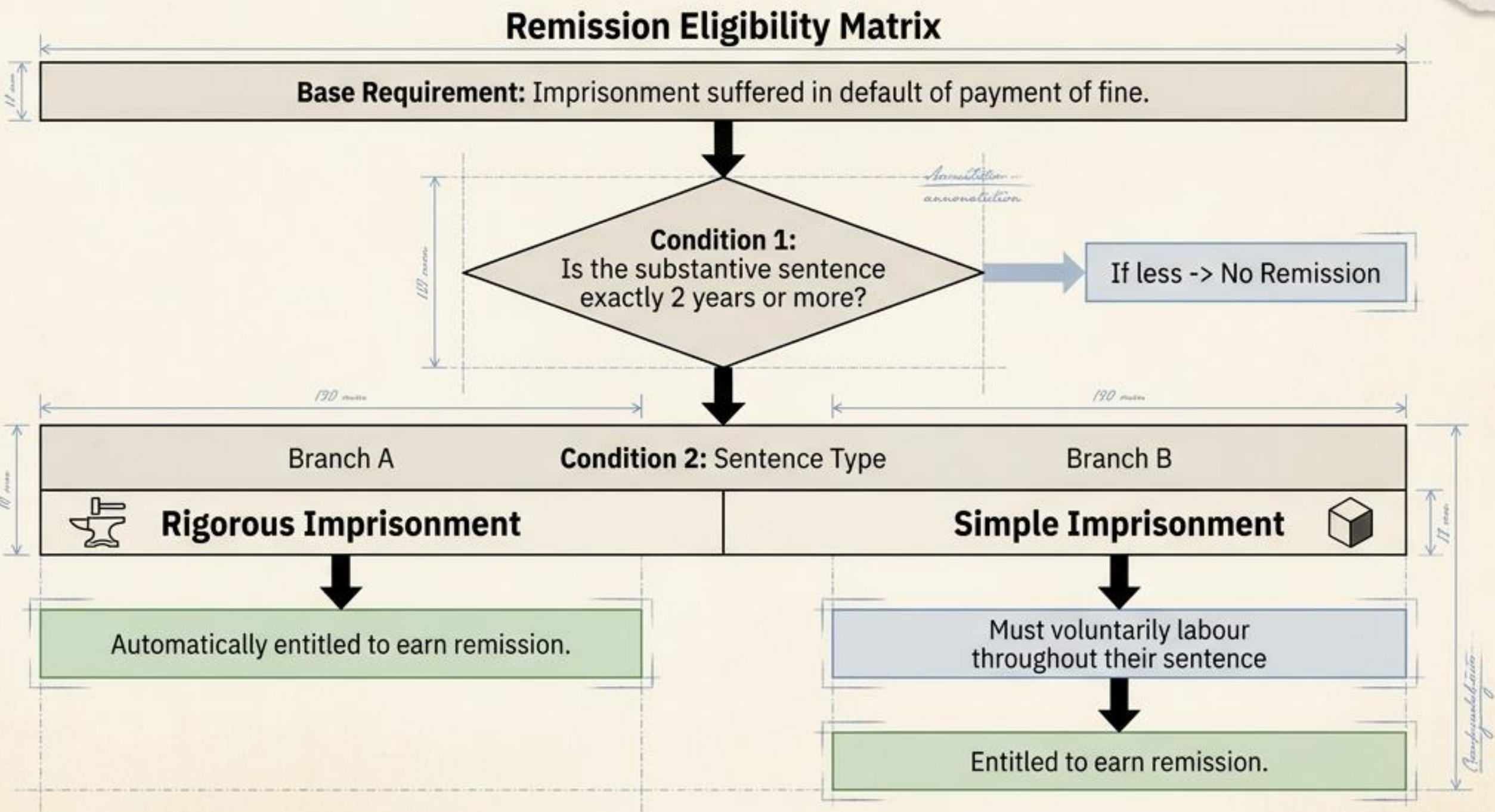
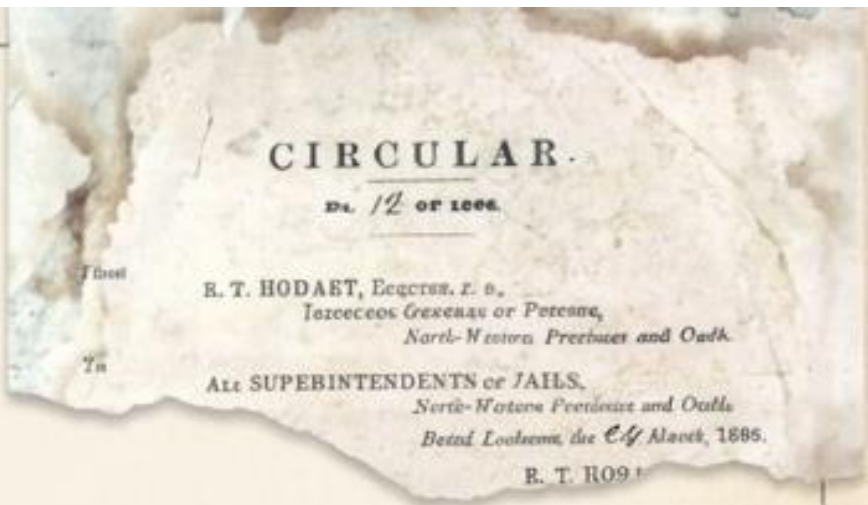
Chain of Command Matrix



Key Takeaway: Welfare is not an absolute right; it is a calculated medical provision requiring specific bureaucratic sanction.

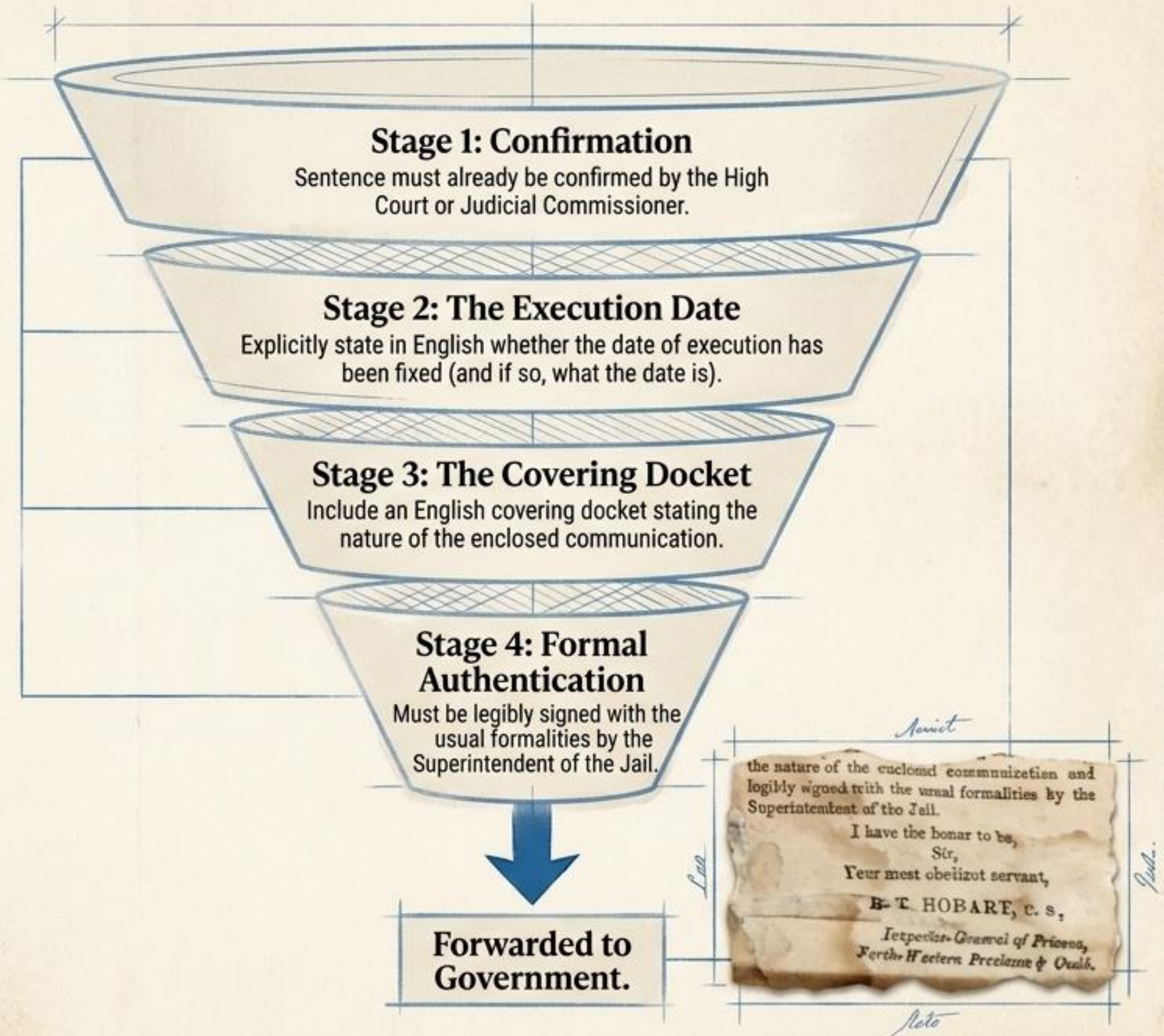
The Judicial Machine: The Logic of Remission

Circular No. 12 (24 March 1886) clarifies the rules for awarding good conduct marks to prisoners serving time in default of fine payment.



The Capital Petition Funnel

Circular No. 14 instructs Superintendents on the exact formalities required when forwarding petitions from prisoners condemned to death.



The Shadow Archive: Tracing the Missing Directives

Archival research relies on navigating intentional bureaucratic filing architectures. This fragment serves as a cross-reference map to the wider governing structure.

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Analytical Takeaway

The Inspector-General's office operated a dual-track filing system. Operational directives (like those analysed in this deck) were circulated directly to Superintendents, while higher-level mandates were permanently bound in a separate government order file book.

Synthesis: The Triad of Colonial Penal Control

The 1886 circulars reveal a prison system that was not merely punitive, but a highly calibrated administrative machine balancing three competing priorities.
